Lions Centennial

The Oklahoma City Downtown Lions Club chartered Sept. 12, 1916; the Tulsa Downtown Lions Club chartered Oct. 11, 1916; and the Muskogee Lions Club chartered Oct. 26, 1916. They were all designated as Founders Clubs by the International Association of Lions Clubs after they formed in 1917. Other Oklahoma Founders Clubs are Ardmore (3/12/1917), Chickasha (7/28/1917), El Reno (8/16/1917) and Okmulgee (2/5/1919).

Lion Howard Potts, longtime Secretary/Treasurer of the Muskogee Lions Club, asks to participate with the other 1916 clubs to do a special Centennial observance in the fall 2016. The OK Lions state office will help with that effort if needed. The State Convention Planning Committee may want to do

something special for the Centennial in 2016-2017; interested Lions should contact their district governors and SCPC district committee members.

Multiple District 3, the Lions of Oklahoma, does not have a LCI Centennial Coordinator nor any LCI approved/appointed district coordinators. Past District Governor Carobelle Carson is active in District 3-A on behalf of the LCI Centennial. LCI does have a well-planned program for both district and multiple district coordinators who have applied through their district governor to LCI and have been approved, and those coordinators now have a small LCI budget to reimburse expenses.

Council (State) Secretary Dawn Miller, along with PCC Tom Cummings and 3-H First Vice District Governor Troy Jenkins ask

for Lion volunteers to help with the history of Oklahoma Lions, especially photographs. The existing photos in the state office need to be digitized (scanned for electronic archival), labeled and a choice few need to be framed for display at the state office for the Centennial Years. 3-O CLUB NEWS

Barnsdall: Held Fun Night at the Community Center with food and fireworks.

Bartlesville Downtown: Club members and other volunteers helped pack and distribute 2,600 school backpacks in Washington County. Lions cooked and served pancakes and sausage for over 50 members of Bridges out of Poverty. Collected and shipped 26 pounds of used eyeglasses to state office in OKC. Since January the club has donated over \$6,000 to civic and charitable organizations in Bartlesville. Members attended GED graduation ceremony for the adult education program they help support.
