club alive despite what others may think? [Have you vowed, "This club will not die!"](#) From Floundering to Flourishing!!! Part 1.

Start planning the renewal of this club, if you are indeed committed to its rejuvenation. Start by making sure that you are submitting your reports to LCI on time whenever it is required of your Secretary to do so. Have an agenda for your club meetings that your President works from. It is very important that your club encourages Membership at each meeting. Find ways to reward members for their service to the club. It could be like a large candy bar, a small single flower in a vase, or something like a Lions pin and any small item that would show your member that you appreciate their service. Any club that meets the above goals is serving its membership well and that pays dividends in club participation, enthusiasm and membership. Enthusiastic participation makes meetings fun and effective and attracts new members.

One of the first things you need to do is to stop the "bleeding" and stabilize your club. Recruit new members through in-personal new workings and improve the quality of your meetings. 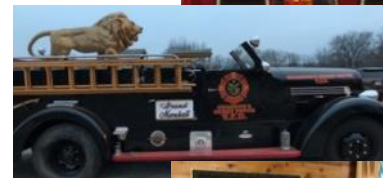

Lions sure know how to throw a party:

West Side Lions and their Plaza

Lions branch collected toys for Reach Our City children and heard musician David Gonzalez at a Christmas dinner and "white elephant" contest. Members also donated to a local food pantry.

Oklahoma City Downtown Lions, with help from local high school students, hosted a Halloween Party for children and adults with special needs at The Rock Church of Christ for nearly 200 guests, providing food, drinks and dancing music! Feed the Children donated books and giveaways. Another party for the group celebrated Christmas, this time with friends from All Saints Catholic School, Western Heights High School ROTC, and Santa Claus!

Downtown kicked off Feed the Children's "No Hunger Holidays Campaign" and piloted their new "ACTION" program. The club helped to provide food, essentials and personal items boxes to 400 families of Rancho Village Elementary. Every child will receive multiple books over the next six weeks and the club also will provide meals for 200 children each week for several weeks with a concluding event providing more food and gifts for the kids.

The school hosted a reading night and Downtown Lions were there with the MHSU and eye screenings for 50 children. Volunteers read to the children and they were able to choose books to take home. More than 400 food boxes were given to take home. The program ended with 400 backpacks with food and gifts being passed out for the holidays. Downtown Lions were joined by volunteers from Feed the Children and St. Luke United Methodist Church.

Norman Lions marched in the city Veterans Day parade.

Ada Lions held a holiday gala and inducted several new members, as well as honoring longtime Lions, including PDG Daryl Pults and PDG Tony Dowell.

Wanette Lions continued their 65-year tradition of the longest-running wildcat shooting event in Oklahoma – Wanette Lions Turkey Shoot – on Sunday afternoons during the fall. Then celebrated with a holiday feast and awards.

Seminole Lions hosted a spectacular "Cowboy Cadillac" drawing and are congratulated on superb sponsorship of the event! The club presented their annual Snowman Wonderland light festival and numerous special events in the month of December, including pony rides, tram rides, and two bicycle giveaways.
